Pre-residency

Submit a full written manuscript of a message that you have delivered from the New Testament epistles. Add a cover page that clearly states the passage of Scripture you communicated, and the major points of your message.



Residency

1. Focus

This residency is critical to your success in the CrossTalk program. To succeed you must, for these two weeks, give your entire time and attention to our work together.

To ensure that you are fully prepared and engaged for every day of class, it is strongly recommended that you don't plan any midweek ministry activities during the residency.

2. Homework

Homework will frequently be assigned at the end of a class day. Be sure that you are ready to share your completed homework with the class the following day.

3. Participation

Success requires that we meaningfully interact with each other during our classes. You need to be making at least three meaningful observations and ask at least three meaningful questions every day.

4. Biblical communication

On the Friday of each week (2 times per residency) every student will deliver a message to the class. These 12 - 15 minute messages will be given without notes and should demonstrate a working knowledge of the material covered in class.

Before delivering the message, students will submit a one-page message summary to the class. This summary will include the natural unit of Scripture, exegetical, homiletical and communicating ideas, and purpose as well as the homiletical outline of the message being delivered. Copies will be made available to the entire class.

5. Observations

A video record will be made of each message, and students will watch their message and reflect on thee experience by completing the 'Recorded Viewing Form'.

6. Final Exam.

On the last day of class a written exam will be given to determine each student's ability to identify the big idea of a natural unit of epistle literature.
